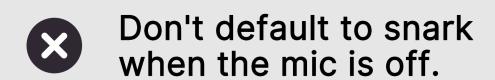
10 quiet habits that build unshakeable credibility

Your presence teaches people how to treat you



Speak well of others when they're not around





Say things you'd be proud to have repeated.



Show up 2 minutes early, not 2 minutes frantic

"Running late" isn't your brand. It's not impressive.



Being on time signals: "Your time matters to me."





Make people feel remembered

Don't just nod through conversations, note details.



Try: "How did your daughter's soccer tryouts go?"





Apologize like a grown-up



Don't say "I'm sorry, but—"



Try: "You're right. I didn't handle that well."



Don't absorb other people's urgency

Their emergency doesn't have to become yours.



Pause. Breathe. Then decide how urgent it really is.

Say what you'll do, then actually do it

Don't make "sorry for the delay!" your email signature.



Trust is built in consistent follow through.



Admit what you don't know



Nobody expects you to be the expert on everything.



Try: "That's outside my area. Who should we ask?"





Help others shine brighter than you

Don't hoard the spotlight or good ideas.



Let Maya present her own work to senior leadership.



Accept feedback gracefully

Your first instinct doesn't have to be defense



Try: "That's helpful. Say more."





Make people feel like they belong

Don't save your warmth for people with titles.



Kindness to everyone is just good business.



Your presence teaches people how to treat you.
