# (and your career)

#### 1. Follow the 2:1 giving ratio

Provide value at least twice before asking for anything.

# Implement the dormant tie technique

Reconnect with valuable past connections.

### 3. Use the "interested, not interesting" approach

Focus conversations on the other person instead of impressing them.

### 4. Practice the 5-minute favor rule

When meeting someone new, ask yourself, "What can I do in 5 minutes that would meaningfully help this person?"

#### 5. Schedule loose-touch check-ins

Regular, low-pressure touchpoints maintain relationships.

#### Create content that serves your network

Position yourself as a resource.

# 7. Use the 3-person networking strategy

When attending events, ditch the business cards; aim to meet 3 new quality connections.

# 8. Practice conversational generosity

Introduce people to others in group settings.

# 9. Leverage the "uncommon commonality"

Find unexpected shared interests beyond work.

### 10. Create networking triggers

Set up systems that prompt regular connection.



# **11.** Apply the diverse network principle

Intentionally connect with people outside your immediate field.

#### 12. Create a personal board of directors

Cultivate relationships with 5-7 trusted advisors.

#### 13. Practice network bridging

Connect people from different parts of your network.

### 14. Make specific, actionable asks

Be clear about what you need.

#### 15. Implement "valuestory-ask" framework

Structure networking messages with value first, brief context, then a clear request.

# 16. Adopt the sweat equity approach

Volunteer for industry organizations or committees.

# 17. Use the "reciprocity ring" technique

In team settings, create structured opportunities for everyone to request and offer help.

# 18. Apply selective vulnerability

Share appropriate professional or personal challenges.

# 19. Implement the network renewal practice

Systematically review and strengthen your network quarterly.

# 20. Use curiosity-based networking

Lead with genuine questions about others' work.
